## SCULLIN CRITICIZES 'SHAMELESS SELF-PROMOTERS' IN GAMES

NORCROSS, GEORGIA, JULY 25, 1996-- Local athlete, Patrick Scullin, is fit to be tied at the "show-offiness" of the athletes competing in the Centennial Olympic Games being held down the road in Atlanta.

"It's sickening," says a disgusted Scullin, "these people, many of whom I suspect to be foreigners, are shameless self-promoters. The instant they see TV cameras and the attention of the world media on them, these people go and do amazing feats of athleticism.
